# TAP is Shakin' Up Shakespeare!





# Tristani on the Town

(The lovely and talented Susanne Tristani was once again off to the Big Apple where she enjoyed the finest that the Great White Way had to offer. And what better way to spend an evening than with a bunch of men with large coconuts. Here's her report:)

I recently had the good fortune to see *Spamalot* at the Sam S. Shubert Theatre in New York (the town so nice, they named it twice!). *Spamalot* is a musical (yeah!) adaptation of the film *Monty Python and the Holy Grail*. With Eric Idle, one of the original Pythoners, writing the book, lyrics, and cowriting the music, I was certain that the distinct style of humour would be maintained.

If you've seen the film, many of the quirky scenes were also in the play, such as the Black Knight, the French Taunters, the Knights of Ni, and the Killer Rabbit. All of these were very well transposed to the stage in clever and sometimes cheeky ways, using movable scenery and distractions to set up later effects. However, what truly makes this play a separate entity are the song and dance numbers. An incredibly talented cast gave incredibly funny performances that had me in stitches from start to finish.

Apparently, *Spamalot* is coming to Toronto shortly, and I highly recommend it. The cool thing about seeing it on Broadway is seeing really famous people in the cast. David Hyde Pierce (Niles Crane from *Frasier*) played a number of roles and was very funny in a deadpan way. Playing many

parts with much more variety was Hank Azaria, who was in the films *Godzilla* and *Mystery Men*, and who does a number of voices on *The Simpsons*. His French Taunter was positively side splitting and even though at one point he broke character and started laughing (another actor had his back to the audience, so I wonder what he was doing!), he was certainly the most versatile actor on the stage.

When the show opened, the beyond fabulous Tim Curry played the role of King Arthur. Unfortunately, by the time I got to New York he had moved on to the London production. His replacement, Simon Russell Beale, was good, but I just kept envisioning what a meal Curry would have made of that part! Finally, if

you ask me who knocked my socks off the most in this show, I would have to give full marks to Lauren Kennedy (The Lady of the Lake) and Christopher Sieber (Sir Dennis Galahad, The Black Knight, et al). Kennedy is a tiny, knockout redhead with a huge set of pipes who totally owned the stage whenever she was out there. Sieber is a big, gorgeous hunk who was very committed to every part he played, and was very funny (he was the one who made Hank Azaria laugh).

Bottom line - I LOVED IT!

But was it good theater? Well let me put it this way...I'm still not sure what the story was all about, or who all those people were on stage, or why they were chasing the ring. And I don't know if I felt any empathy for the hobbits in their quest for the "precious".

In other words, Tennessee Williams has nothing to worry about from this show.

But the big spider-thingie was cool!
